## $q$-Middle Convolution and $\boldsymbol{q}$-Painlevé Equation

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#### Abstract

A $q$-deformation of the middle convolution was introduced by Sakai and Yamaguchi. We apply it to a linear $q$-difference equation associated with the $q$-Painlevé VI equation. Then we obtain integral transformations. We investigate the $q$-middle convolution in terms of the affine Weyl group symmetry of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation. We deduce an integral transformation on the $q$-Heun equation.


Key words: $q$-Painlevé equation; $q$-Heun equation; middle convolution; integral transformation
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## 1 Introduction

The middle convolution was introduced by Katz [8] for local systems on a punctured Riemann sphere, and Dettweiler and Reiter [3, 4] reformulated it for the Fuchsian system of differential equations. Here the Fuchsian system of differential equations is the system of linear differential equations written as

\end{equation*}

where $Y$ is a column vector with $n$ entries and $A_{1}, A_{2}, \ldots, A_{r}$ are constant matrices of size $n \times n$. We review briefly the definition of the middle convolution for equation (1.1) (or the tuple of the matrices $\left(A_{1}, \ldots, A_{r}\right)$ ). Let $\lambda \in \mathbb{C}$ and $F_{i}, i=1, \ldots, r$, be the matrix of size $n r \times n r$ of the form

\end{array}\right)(i),
$$

where $I_{n}$ is the identity matrix of size $n$. Then the correspondence of the tuple of matrices $\left(A_{1}, \ldots, A_{r}\right) \mapsto\left(F_{1}, \ldots, F_{r}\right)$ (or the correspondence of the associated Fuchsian system) is called the convolution. The convolution does not preserve the irreducibility in general. It is shown that the following subspaces $\mathcal{K}, \mathcal{L}$ of $\mathbb{C}^{n r}$ are preserved by the action of $F_{i}, i=1, \ldots, r$,

We denote the linear transformation induced from the action of $F_{i}$ on the quotient space $\mathbb{C}^{n r} /(\mathcal{K}+\mathcal{L})$ by $\bar{F}_{i}$. The correspondence of the tuple of matrices $\left(A_{1}, \ldots, A_{r}\right) \mapsto\left(\bar{F}_{1}, \ldots, \bar{F}_{r}\right)$ (or the correspondence of the associated Fuchsian system) is called the middle convolution. It was shown in [3] that the convolution is related with Euler's integral transformation. Let $Y(x)$ be a solution of equation (1.1). Set

\end{array}\right)

Then $W(x)$ is a column vector with $n r$ entries. We apply Euler's integral transformation for each entry of $W(x)$, i.e., we set

G(x)=\int_{\Delta} W(s)(x-s)^{\lambda} \mathrm{d} s
$$

where $\Delta$ is an appropriate cycle in $\mathbb{C}$ with the variable $s$. Then the function $G(x)$ satisfies the following Fuchsian system of differential equation

\frac{\mathrm{d} Y}{\mathrm{~d} x}=\left(\frac{F_{1}}{x-t_{1}}+\frac{F_{2}}{x-t_{2}}+\cdots+\frac{F_{r}}{x-t_{r}}\right) Y
$$

where $F_{1}, \ldots, F_{r}$ were defined in equation (1.2).
Sakai and Yamaguchi [10] constructed a theory of a $q$-deformation of the middle convolution for systems of $q$-difference equations. Here the system is described as

Y(q x)=\left(B_{\infty}+\frac{B_{1}}{1-x / t_{1}}+\cdots+\frac{B_{r}}{1-x / t_{r}}\right) Y(x)
$$

where $Y(x)$ is a column vector with $n$ entries and $B_{\infty}, B_{1}, \ldots, B_{r}$ are constant matrices of size $n \times n$. The construction of the $q$-middle convolution is similar to the case of the Fuchsian system of differential equations. For details, see Section 2.

In this paper we apply the $q$-middle convolution to linear $q$-difference equations which are related to the $q$-Painlevé VI equation

\end{equation*}

with the constraint $b_{1} b_{2} a_{3} a_{4}=q a_{1} a_{2} b_{3} b_{4}$. Here $\bar{y}$ and $\bar{z}$ denotes the time evolution $t \mapsto q t$ of $y$ and $z$, and the parameters $a_{1}, \ldots, a_{4}, b_{1}, \ldots, b_{4}$ are time-independent. The $q$-Painlevé VI equation was introduced by Jimbo and Sakai [6] as a $q$-deformation of the Painlevé VI equation. They obtained equation (1.3) by introducing a $q$-analogue of the monodromy preserving deformation, and it is related to the linear $q$-difference equations

where $A(x)$ is a $2 \times 2$ matrix with polynomial entries (see equation (3.2) for details). The linear $q$-difference equation which we apply the $q$-middle convolution is not equation (1.4) but the transformed equation

\end{align*}

for some constant $c_{0}$. By applying the $q$-middle convolution with the parameter $\lambda$, we obtain $2 \times 2$ matrices, if we choose the constants $c_{0}$ and $\lambda$ suitably. Then we obtain a correspondence of the parameters, and we may regard it as a correspondence of the $q$-Painlevé VI equations. On the other hand, it is known that the $q$-Painlevé VI equation has a symmetry of the affine Weyl group of type $D_{5}^{(1)}$, and a realization of the symmetry was described in the review [7] of Kajiwara, Noumi and Yamada. In this paper, we express the symmetry by the $q$-middle convolution in terms of the generators of the affine Weyl group.

In [11], a relationship between the $q$-Painlevé VI equation and the $q$-Heun equation

was studied from a viewpoint of the initial value space. In particular, the $q$-Heun equation was obtained from the linear $q$-difference equation associated to the $q$-Painlevé VI equation by specializing the parameters. On the other hand, the $q$-middle convolution induces an integral transformation of the linear $q$-difference equation. By considering a particular specialization, the linear $q$-difference equation turns out to be the $q$-Heun equation and we obtain an integral transformation of $q$-Heun equation.

This paper is organized as follows. In Section 2, we review a part of the theory of the $q$-middle convolution established by Sakai and Yamaguchi [10]. In Section 3, we recall the linear $q$-difference equation associated to the $q$-Painlevé VI equation and calculate the $q$-middle convolution for it. In Section 4, we investigate the symmetry by the $q$-middle convolution in terms of the Weyl group symmetry of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation. For this purpose, we clarify a relationship between equation (1.5) and the Lax pair in [7]. In Section 5, we obtain an integral transformation on the $q$-Heun equation. In Section 6, we give concluding remarks.

## $2 \quad q$-middle convolution

We recall the $q$-convolution and the $q$-middle convolution introduced by Sakai and Yamaguchi [10].

Let $\mathbf{B}=\left(B_{\infty} ; B_{1}, \ldots, B_{N}\right)$ be the tuple of the square matrices of the same size and $\mathbf{b}=$ $\left(b_{1}, b_{2}, \ldots, b_{N}\right)$ be the tuple of the non-zero complex numbers which are different from one another. We denote by $E_{\mathbf{B}, \mathbf{b}}$ the linear $q$-difference equations

Y(q x)=B(x) Y(x), \quad B(x)=B_{\infty}+\sum_{i=1}^{N} \frac{B_{i}}{1-x / b_{i}} .
$$

Definition 2.1 ( $q$-convolution, [10]). Let $\mathbf{B}=\left(B_{\infty} ; B_{1}, \ldots, B_{N}\right)$ be the tuple of $m \times m$ matrices and $\left(b_{1}, b_{2}, \ldots, b_{N}\right)$ be the tuple of the non-zero complex numbers which are different one another. Set $B_{0}=I_{m}-B_{\infty}-B_{1}-\cdots-B_{N}$, We define the $q$-convolution $c_{\lambda}:\left(B_{\infty} ; B_{1}, \ldots, B_{N}\right) \mapsto$ $\left(F_{\infty} ; F_{1}, \ldots, F_{N}\right)$ as follows:

O & \cdots & B_{N} \\

\end{array}(i+1), \quad 1 \leq i \leq N,\right. \\
& F_{\infty}=I_{(N+1) m}-\widehat{F}, \quad \widehat{F}=\left(\begin{array}{ccc}
B_{0} & \cdots & B_{N} \\
\vdots & \ddots & \vdots \\
B_{0} & \cdots & B_{N}
\end{array}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Let $\xi \in \mathbb{C} \backslash\{0\}$. The $q$-convolution induces the $q$-analogue of the Euler's integral transformation in terms of the Jackson integral

$$
\int_{0}^{\xi \infty} f(x) \mathrm{d}_{q} x=(1-q) \sum_{n=-\infty}^{\infty} q^{n} \xi f\left(q^{n} \xi\right)
$$

for the solutions of the $q$-difference equations. Note that the value of the Jackson integral may depend on the value $\xi$.

Theorem 2.2 ([10, Theorem 2.1]). Let $Y(x)$ be a solution of $E_{\mathbf{B}, \mathbf{b}}$. Set $b_{0}=0$ and

P_{\lambda}(x, s)=\frac{\left(q^{\lambda+1} s / x ; q\right)_{\infty}}{(q s / x ; q)_{\infty}}=\prod_{i=0}^{\infty} \frac{x-q^{i+\lambda+1} s}{x-q^{i+1} s} .
$$

Define the function $\widehat{Y}(x)$ by

\widehat{Y}_{i}(x)=\int_{0}^{\xi \infty} \frac{P_{\lambda}(x, s)}{s-b_{i}} Y(s) \mathrm{d}_{q} s, \quad i=0, \ldots, N, \quad \widehat{Y}(x)=\left(\begin{array}{c}
\widehat{Y}_{0}(x) \\
\vdots \\
\widehat{Y}_{N}(x)
\end{array}\right)
$$

Then the function $\widehat{Y}(x)$ satisfies the equation $E_{\mathbf{F}, \mathbf{b}}$, i.e.,

\widehat{Y}(q x)=\left(F_{\infty}+\sum_{i=1}^{N} \frac{F_{i}}{1-x / b_{i}}\right) \widehat{Y}(x) .
$$

Although the original theorem by Sakai and Yamaguchi was restricted to the case $\xi=1$ in the Jackson integral, we may just extend it to the case $\xi \in \mathbb{C} \backslash\{0\}$, which was motivated by the theory of the Jackson integral due to Aomoto [1]. The convergence of the Jackson integrals $\widehat{Y}_{i}(x)$, $i=0, \ldots, N$, would not be considered in [10]. In this paper, we discuss the Jackson integrals formally and we do not consider the convergence in details. Namely, we discuss the Jackson integrals under the assumption that the integrals converge absolutely and Theorem 2.2 holds true with the convergence. Thus we use the phrasing "formally" in theorems which are related to the Jackson integral. An aspect of convergence on Theorem 2.2 will be discussed in [2].

The $q$-middle convolution is defined by considering an appropriate quotient space.
Definition 2.3 ( $q$-middle convolution, [10]). We define the $\boldsymbol{F}$-invariant subspaces $\mathcal{K}$ and $\mathcal{L}$ of $\left(\mathbb{C}^{m}\right)^{N+1}$ as follows

\mathcal{K}=\mathcal{K}_{\mathcal{V}}=\left(\begin{array}{c}

\operatorname{ker} B_{N}
\end{array}\right), \quad \mathcal{L}=\mathcal{L}_{\mathcal{V}}(\lambda)=\operatorname{ker}\left(\widehat{F}-\left(1-q^{\lambda}\right) I_{(N+1) m}\right)
$$

We denote the action of $F_{k}$ on the quotient space $\left(\mathbb{C}^{m}\right)^{N+1} /(\mathcal{K}+\mathcal{L})$ by $\bar{F}_{k}, k=\infty, 1, \ldots, N$. Then the $q$-middle convolution $m c_{\lambda}$ is defined by the correspondence $E_{\mathbf{B}, \mathbf{b}} \mapsto E_{\overline{\mathbf{F}}, \mathbf{b}}$, where $\overline{\mathbf{F}}=\left(\bar{F}_{\infty} ; \bar{F}_{1}, \ldots, \bar{F}_{N}\right)$.

The $q$-middle convolution $m c_{\lambda}$ would induce the integral transformation of the solutions by applying the integral transformation on the $q$-convolution, although it would be necessary to consider the subspace $\mathcal{K}+\mathcal{L} \subset\left(\mathbb{C}^{m}\right)^{N+1}$.

## 3 Linear $q$-difference equation associated to $q$-Painlevé VI equation and $q$-middle convolution

We recall the linear $q$-difference equation

Y(q x)=A(x) Y(x), \tag{3.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

which was discussed by Jimbo and Sakai [6] to obtain the $q$-Painlevé VI equation by the connection preserving deformation.

We take the $2 \times 2$ matrix $A(x)$ in equation (3.1) to be of the form

& A_{0}(t) \text { has eigenvalues } t \theta_{1}, t \theta_{2}, \\
& \operatorname{det} A(x)=\chi_{1} \chi_{2}\left(x-t a_{1}\right)\left(x-t a_{2}\right)\left(x-a_{3}\right)\left(x-a_{4}\right) . \tag{3.2}
\end{align*}

Then we have the following relation

\chi_{1} \chi_{2} a_{1} a_{2} a_{3} a_{4}=\theta_{1} \theta_{2} . \tag{3.3}
\end{equation*}

Note that the relations to the parameter of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation in equation (1.3) are given by $b_{1}=a_{1} a_{2} / \theta_{1}, b_{2}=a_{1} a_{2} / \theta_{2}, b_{3}=1 /\left(q \chi_{1}\right), b_{4}=1 / \chi_{2}$.

We need accessory parameters to determine uniquely the elements of the matrix $A(x)$. Write

Then $a_{12}(x)$ is a linear polynomial. We introduce the parameters $w, y, z$ and impose the condition

Then the elements of $A(x)$ are determined as

& \beta=\frac{1}{\chi_{1}-\chi_{2}}\left[-y^{-1}\left(\left(\theta_{1}+\theta_{2}\right) t-\chi_{1} z_{1}-\chi_{2} z_{2}\right)+\chi_{1}\left(\left(a_{1}+a_{2}\right) t+a_{3}+a_{4}-2 y\right)\right], \\

We consider the $q$-middle convolution for the $q$-difference equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y(q x)=B(x) Y(x), \quad B(x)=\frac{A(x)}{c_{0}\left(x-t a_{1}\right)\left(x-t a_{2}\right)} \tag{3.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $c_{0}$ is a constant which will be fixed later. Note that, if $\tilde{Y}(x)$ is a solution of equation (3.1) and the parameter $\mu$ satisfies $q^{\mu}=1 /\left(c_{0} a_{1} a_{2} t^{2}\right)$, then the function

Y(x)=x^{\mu}\left(x /\left(t a_{1}\right) ; q\right)_{\infty}\left(x /\left(t a_{2}\right) ; q\right)_{\infty} \tilde{Y}(x)
$$

satisfies equation (3.6). Write

& B_{1}=\frac{a_{2}}{t \theta_{1}\left(a_{1}-a_{2}\right)}\left(\begin{array}{cc}
\left(y-t a_{1}\right) b_{1}^{[1]} /\left(q y z\left(\chi_{1}-\chi_{2}\right)\right) & w \chi_{2}\left(y-t a_{1}\right) \\
-b_{1}^{[1]} b_{2}^{[1]} /\left(q^{2} w y^{2} z^{2}\left(\chi_{1}-\chi_{2}\right)^{2}\right) & -\chi_{2} b_{2}^{[1]} /\left(q y z\left(\chi_{1}-\chi_{2}\right)\right)

It is shown directly that $\operatorname{det} B_{1}=0$ and det $B_{2}=0$. Set $B_{0}=I_{2}-B_{\infty}-B_{1}-B_{2}\left(=I_{2}-B(0)\right)$. Then the condition $\operatorname{det} B_{0}=0$ is equivalent to $c_{0}=\theta_{1} /\left(t a_{1} a_{2}\right)$ or $c_{0}=\theta_{2} /\left(t a_{1} a_{2}\right)$. We now impose the condition $\operatorname{det} B_{0}=0$. For this purpose, we restrict to the case $c_{0}=\theta_{1} /\left(t a_{1} a_{2}\right)$. Note that the case $c_{0}=\theta_{2} /\left(t a_{1} a_{2}\right)$ can be discussed by replacing the parameters as $\theta_{1} \leftrightarrow \theta_{2}$. We eliminate the parameter $\theta_{2}$ by equation (3.3). It follows from $\operatorname{det} B_{0}=0, \operatorname{det} B_{1}=0$ and $\operatorname{det} B_{2}=0$ that there exists non-zero vectors $\binom{v_{01}}{v_{02}},\binom{v_{11}}{v_{12}},\binom{v_{21}}{v_{22}}$ such that

We normalize the vectors by setting

We investigate the action to the parameters $y$ and $z$. Recall that $y$ and $z$ are determined by equation (3.4). We denote the images of $y$ and $z$ by $\widetilde{y}$ and $\widetilde{z}$. Let $\widetilde{a}_{11}(x)$ (resp. $\widetilde{a}_{12}(x)$ ) be the upper left entry (resp. the upper right entry) of the matrix $\widetilde{A}(x)$. Then the value $\widetilde{y}$ is the zero of the linear function $\widetilde{a}_{12}(x)$, and we have

## $4 \quad q$-middle convolution and Weyl group symmetry of $\boldsymbol{q}$-Painlevé VI equation

We investigate the transformation of the parameters induced by the $q$-middle convolution in terms of the Weyl group symmetry associated with the $q$-Painlevé VI equation. Kajiwara, Noumi and Yamada gave a survey on discrete Painlevé equations in [7]. They presented a list of the Weyl group symmetry and a Lax pair for each discrete Painlevé equation. The $q$-Painlevé VI equation by Jimbo and Sakai [6] corresponds to the equation $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ in [7]. In this section, we make a correspondence between the parameters of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation and those of the equation $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$.

The equation $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ was obtained by the compatibility condition of the Lax pair $L_{1}$ and $L_{2}$ in [7]. The operator $L_{1}$ is defined by

which is independent from the time evolution. Here the parameters are constrained by the relation

In this paper, we do not use the operator $L_{2}$, which contains the operation of the time evolution.

The correspondence between the parameters of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation and those of the equation $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ was made by considering the linear $q$-difference equation $Y(q x)=A(x) Y(x)$ in equation (3.1) and $L_{1} y(x)=0$ in equation (4.1).

For the system of $q$-difference equation

It is seen that the poles $x=y$ and $x=q y$ are cancelled on the coefficient of $u(x)$. By a straightforward calculation (see [12] for details), equation (4.4) is written as

On the relation of the parameters, the condition $\chi_{1} \chi_{2} a_{1} a_{2} a_{3} a_{4}=\theta_{1} \theta_{2}$ is equivalent to equation (4.2). Thus, we obtained a correspondence between the parameters of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation in [6] and those of the equation $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ in [7].

Sakai [9] established that each discrete Painlevé equation has the symmetry in terms of the affine Weyl group, and the description of the symmetry was reviewed explicitly by Kajiwara, Noumi and Yamada in [7]. The $q$-Painlevé VI equation has the symmetry of the affine Weyl group of the type $D_{5}^{(1)}$. We describe the action of the operators $s_{0}, \ldots, s_{5}$ for the parameters $\left(\kappa_{1}, \kappa_{2}, \nu_{1}, \ldots, \nu_{8}\right) \in\left(\mathbb{C}^{\times}\right)^{10}$ and $(f, g) \in \mathbb{P}^{1} \times \mathbb{P}^{1}$ as follows

The omitted variables are invariant by the action, i.e., $s_{2}(f)=f$. Then we can confirm that these operations satisfy the relations of the Weyl group $W\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ whose Dynkin diagram is as follows


On the other hand, the $q$-middle convolution induces the transformation of the parameters of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation given in equation (3.23), although there was an arbitrary parameter $\widetilde{c}$. We describe it in terms of the Weyl group action by specializing the parameter $\widetilde{c}$ in equation (3.22).
Proposition 4.1. We specify the parameter $\widetilde{c}$ in equation (3.22) by setting $\widetilde{c}=\chi_{2}$. Then the transformation of the parameters of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation which is induced by the q-middle convolution coincides with the action
by the generators of $W\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$, and it is written as

## 5 Integral transformation on $\boldsymbol{q}$-Heun equation

We interpret the integral transformation in Theorem 3.1 as the one for solutions of the single second-order linear $q$-difference equations.

## Proposition 5.1.

(i) The function $y_{1}(x)$ in equation (3.20) satisfies

Equation (3.21) is obtained as the form of equation (3.20) by replacing the parameters as $(y, z) \rightarrow(\widetilde{y}, \widetilde{z})$ and equation (3.23) up to the ambiguity of the parameter $w$, and the $q$-difference equation for $\check{y}_{1}(x)$ does not depend on the parameter $w$. Hence (ii) follows from equation (3.22) with the condition $\widetilde{c}=\chi_{2}$.

Theorem 5.2. Assume that $y_{1}(x)$ is a solution to equation (5.1) and $\lambda$ satisfies $q^{\lambda}=\chi_{2} a_{1} a_{2} t / \theta_{1}$. Then the function

Note that these equations are the $q$-Heun equation, and the specialization of the parameters is related to the initial value space of $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ (see [11]). By replacing the parameters, we obtain the following theorem on the $q$-Heun equation.

We evaluate the values $a_{1}, a_{2}, a_{3}$ and $a_{4}$ as $a_{3}=h_{1} q^{1 / 2}, a_{4}=h_{2} q^{-1 / 2}, t a_{1}=l_{1} q^{-1 / 2}$ and $t a_{2}=l_{2} q^{-1 / 2}$, and fix the ratios $\theta_{1} / \chi_{1}$ and $\theta_{1} / \chi_{2}$ by $l_{3}=\theta_{1} /\left(\chi_{1} t a_{1} a_{2}\right)$ and $l_{4}=q \theta_{1} /\left(\chi_{2} t a_{1} a_{2}\right)$. It follows from the relation $\chi_{1} \chi_{2} a_{1} a_{2} a_{3} a_{4}=\theta_{1} \theta_{2}$ in equation (3.3) that $h_{3}=l_{1} l_{2} l_{3} l_{4} /\left(h_{1} h_{2} q^{2}\right)=\theta_{1} / \theta_{2}$. Then equation (5.8) is written as equation (5.6) by setting $g(x)=y_{1}(x)$. We apply Theorem 5.2 , where the parameters $y$ and $z$ are specialized as equation (5.5). Then we obtain equation (5.7) by the $q$-integral transformation. By rewriting the parameters $a_{1}, a_{2}, a_{3}, a_{4}, \theta_{1} / \chi_{1}, \theta_{1} / \chi_{2}$ and $\theta_{1} / \theta_{2}$, we obtain equation (5.9).

## 6 Concluding remarks

In this paper, we applied the $q$-middle convolution to a linear $q$-difference equation associated with the $q$-Painlevé VI equation, and we obtain integral transformations as a consequence. We investigated the symmetry by the $q$-middle convolution in terms of the affine Weyl group symmetry of the $q$-Painlevé VI equation. As an application, we obtained an integral transformation on the $q$-Heun equation. Note that our result is a $q$-analogue of the results in $[5,13,14]$ on the Painlevé VI equation, the middle convolution and Heun's differential equation.

In [10], the $q$-convolution was connected to the $q$-integral transformation by the Jackson integral. On the other hand, the convolution for the system of Fuchsian differential equations was connected to the Euler's integral transformation, and there are several choice of the cycles on the integration by the Pochhammer contour. Thus, there is a problem to find more cycles on the $q$-integral transformation associated with the $q$-convolution. Other problems related with the general $q$-middle convolution may be found from our explicit application of the specified $q$-middle convolution.

The $q$-Painlevé VI equation was denoted by $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ in [7], and the Weyl group symmetry and the Lax pair of discrete Painlevé equations including $q-P\left(D_{5}^{(1)}\right)$ were reviewed in [7]. The equations $q-P\left(E_{6}^{(1)}\right)$ and $q-P\left(E_{7}^{(1)}\right)$ are also $q$-analogue of the Painlevé VI equation. We hope to extend the symmetry of integral transformations to the cases $q-P\left(E_{6}^{(1)}\right)$ and $q-P\left(E_{7}^{(1)}\right)$ by using the $q$-middle convolution, which might be related with the variants of $q$-Heun equation $[15,16]$. There is also a problem to connect the degenerated $q$-Painlevé equations (e.g., $q-P\left(A_{4}^{(1)}\right)$ ) with the $q$-middle convolution. In this direction, the theory of the $q$-middle convolution for the non-Fuchsian $q$-difference equation is anticipated.

## A Middle convolution for other parameters

In Section 3, we discussed the middle convolution which is related to the $q$-Painlevé VI equation. The space $\mathcal{L}$ was defined in equation (3.12) and we imposed the condition $q^{\lambda}=\chi_{2} a_{1} a_{2} t / \theta_{1}$ in Section 3 , which induces $\operatorname{dim}(\mathcal{L})=1$. In the appendix, we discuss the case $q^{\lambda}=\chi_{1} a_{1} a_{2} t / \theta_{1}$, which also induces $\operatorname{dim}(\mathcal{L})=1$.

We continue the argument in the case $q^{\lambda}=\chi_{1} a_{1} a_{2} t / \theta_{1}$ by replacing the matrix $P$ in equation (3.13) with

By applying Theorem 2.2, it is shown that the function $\bar{Y}(x)=\binom{\check{y}_{1}(x)}{y_{2}(x)}$ defined by

Hence we obtain the following proposition.
Proposition A.1. We specify the parameters $\widetilde{c}$ and $\widetilde{d}$ by setting $\widetilde{d}=\chi_{1} t a_{1} a_{2} / \theta_{1}$ and $\widetilde{c} \widetilde{d}^{2}=1$. Then the transformation of the parameters induced by the q-middle convolution in the case $q^{\lambda}=\chi_{1} t a_{1} a_{2} / \theta_{1}$ is realized by the action of $s_{3}$ given in equation (4.7).

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
